



Dear Friends of the Great Lakes,

This year marks the 55th anniversary of the Alliance for the Great Lakes. That's 55 years of advocacy, action, and commitment to clean water and the communities who depend on it. It's a legacy built by people like you—people who show up, speak out, and never stop fighting for what matters.

Your support in 2024 led to major wins that will protect our lakes.

You helped us ensure construction on the Brandon Road Lock & Dam started in 2025—an essential step in keeping invasive carp out of the lakes. And we celebrated a huge milestone: Adopt-a-Beach volunteers collected the 10 millionth piece of litter over the life of the program – 86% of which is plastic - backed by a powerful new report that's advancing national and state action on plastic pollution.

You helped push the EPA to finalize new lead standards that will require most Great Lakes water utilities to replace harmful lead service lines within the next decade—including tougher standards for cities like Cleveland and Chicago. We also built an innovative agricultural pollution monitoring network in Michigan's Lake Erie watershed, a critical step in fighting toxic algae blooms.

Beyond the policy wins, your impact was felt on the ground. From Duluth to Detroit, Chicago to Cleveland, thousands joined our efforts this year—cleaning shorelines, advocating for change, and ensuring that clean water infrastructure reaches the communities that need it most.

No matter who's in office, we've made one thing clear: the Great Lakes must remain a national priority. And we'll keep standing firm to make sure they do.

Whether you were one of the volunteers who helped remove more than 573,000 pieces of litter from Great Lakes beaches in 2024, one of the advocates who sent more than 16,000 messages to decision-makers, or one of the donors who fueled our work—this progress is yours.

So, let's celebrate where we've been—and keep building the future we all deserve.

For the lakes. For our communities. For generations to come.

2024 Acomplishments

United by Water. Driven by Action.

We believe fresh, healthy, and clean water is an essential resource and right for all life. This year, the Alliance for the Great Lakes continued its long-standing legacy of protecting the waters that define our region.

Thanks to supporters like you, we're proud to say we've made progress toward our enduring goal: a healthy Great Lakes for all.







Advocacy and Leadership

Invasive Species: We're blocking invasive species that threaten our lakes. As a result of our decades of advocacy, construction of the Brandon Road Lock & Dam in Illinois finally began in early 2025. This project will be the most effective deterrent to keep invasive carp from entering the Great Lakes.



Restoring Our Lakes: Thanks to our efforts, the federal government's most important program to fund Great Lakes restoration projects includes a stronger focus on climate change and environmental justice, which will guide its funding priorities in the future.

Agriculture: The Alliance launched a five-year, \$5 million+ project to conduct innovative water testing to better understand the effects of agricultural pollution on western Lake Erie. Our work will support improved targeting of conservation practices in Michigan to reduce polluted runoff. We hope this will become a model for other states.

Education and Action

Supporter Action: Our dedicated advocates have sent more than 16,000 messages to federal, state, and local

decision makers about protecting the Great Lakes and the people who rely on them.

Adopt-a-Beach: Our Adopt-a-Beach cleanup volunteers collected a milestone 10 millionth piece of litter since the program started collecting data 20 years ago. In 2024, nearly 10,000 volunteers removed litter from all five Great Lakes.

Safe and Clean Water: We're working to ensure state and federal infrastructure funding doesn't bypass low-income communities and communities of color who often bear an unfair burden of failing water systems. Our 200+ member forum provides information and training to bring funds to communities in critical need of safe drinking water and protection from flooding and sewage overflows.


Research and Analysis

Plastic Pollution: In April, the Alliance released a groundbreaking report, 20 Years of Great Lakes Litter Data, which analyzes 20 years of volunteer generated data through the Alliance's Adopt-a-Beach program. This report gained national media attention and has strengthened our work to reduce the scourge of Great Lakes plastic pollution.

Green Solutions to Flooding and Sewer Overflows: In Chicago and surrounding communities, we are working with city departments and community organizations to create a roadmap for critically needed water infrastructure improvements. This program is designed to lead to improved public health and cleaner water.



Spotlighting New Threats to our Water Supply: We are diving in on an emerging issue: the risks of large-scale water users like data centers. Their rapid growth and overlap with other water demands could pose real risks to the water sources we and our region's ecosystems depend on. We're working to ensure these risks are part of transparent public conversations and decisions before any harm is done.



Our Policy and Action Agenda

This is a defining moment for the Great Lakes. The policies and protections we've fought hard to secure face growing threats. But we are not backing down.

We remain focused on:

- Safeguarding hard fought policy protections and funding like the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative and the Great Lakes Compact
- Ensuring clean, safe, and affordable water services, and protection from flooding, sewage and contaminated drinking water
- Reducing agricultural pollution to prevent harmful algal blooms, polluted drinking water, and dead zones in the Great Lakes
- Preventing aquatic invasive species from entering and proliferating in the Great Lakes
- Stemming the tide of plastic pollution into our waters
- Building local leadership and educating decision-makers around clean water in Great Lakes communities
- Activating tens of thousands of volunteers and advocates to act to protect the Great Lakes
- Promoting policies that protect our water resources as the region faces growing pressure from large water users such as data centers, mining, and agriculture.




United by Water
